USF CAPSTONE WATER RESOURCES/ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN COURSE CLASS CONTINUES THE WINNING TRADITION AT THE FWEA STUDENT DESIGN COMPETITION

This past spring, the University of South Florida's (USF) Capstone Water Resources/Environmental Design (Capstone) class sent two teams to FWEA's student design competition (SDC) at the Gaylord Palms Resort and Convention Center in Kissimmee and each team won their respective divisions; wastewater and environmental. With the wins, each team advances to WEFTEC 2016 in order to compete against student teams from across the country in New Orleans in September.

The environmental category team, comprised of Rebecca Braz (Project Manager), Christin Gentz, Poe Poe Min Hlaing, Krystin Kadonsky, and Maria Reed, won with their project, "Supplementary Sludge Management Process for City of Plant City Water Reclamation Facility". In the wastewater category, the team comprised of Monica Resto (Project Manager), Dillon Forsyth, Wainella Isaacs, Madeline Kender, Jon Knudsen, and Vittoria Zucchelli won with their project, "Developing Solutions for the City of Plant City's Water Reclamation Facility to Handle Increased Septage Loads Due to the Ban from Florida SB 550."

This year, the class was taught by USF professor Jim Mihelcic, PhD, BCEEM and me. Jim was filling in for Sarina Ergas, PhD, PE while she was on sabbatical the past year from USF in the Netherlands, Israel, and China. Each year the class works with a local municipality, and we partnered with the City of Plant City this year. Frank Coughenour, PE, Utilities Director; Lucy Gassaway, EI, Staff Engineer; Al Miller, Water Resources Management Superintendent; and Patrick Murphy, Chief Plant Operator worked with the class and their assistance was greatly appreciated by the students, Jim and me. Tom Rawls, PE, Hillsborough County; Steve Leavitt, PE, City of St. Petersburg; Matt Love, PE, Gresham, Smith and Partners; Robert Gaylord, PE, Hazen and Sawyer; Nicole Smith, EI, McKim & Creed; Mel Butcher, EI, Arcadis; and Tim Ware, PE, Arcadis also provide valuable insight to the class over the semester.



THE ROAD TO A MANAGEMENT/LEADERSHIP TRACK IN THE WATER/WASTEWATER FIELD

I often get asked how a person gets into a management/leadership position. I wanted to spend some time to take a look down the road to a career in management and leadership.

I'm sure many of you have heard of "the Peter Principal" – that one is only promoted to one's highest level of incompetence. In other words, a person is promoted because they are good at their current job, until they are no longer good at their job and stop getting promoted. This seems to happen all too often in the water/wastewater field. Good technical engineers are promoted into management or leadership roles only to find that they prefer doing the technical work and are not good at overseeing a large group of people or setting the direction and vision of their firm. So how do you determine early on that a management leadership career path might be right for you one day? Let's look at a few common traits of managers/leaders:

- Strong communication skills The ability to convey information effectively with people from all backgrounds and technical areas.
- **Business acumen** One who has a penchant towards business and sees the bigger picture.
- **People person** The ability to relate well and be respected and revered by peers and subordinates.
- Ability to multi-task and handle stress under fire

 An individual that comes out calm, cool, and collected in
 high stress situations.
- Confident decision maker One capable of problem solving and exuding clear thought in matters of all levels of importance.
- **Team player** A true leader/manager is one that knows there is no "I' in teamwork.

Now this list is not all encompassing and only touches upon a few traits that are common for a strong manager and leader. For all of you that are interested in pursuing a track in this direction, start small by first taking on a project as a project manager or managing a part-time employee or intern. As they say "Rome wasn't built in a day" so taking a small amount of management and leadership experience gradually and

building upon that over the course of your career is the best course of action and the best way to learn how to be a successful leader.

Achieving a management and/or leadership position takes career-long training to foster and mentor an individual towards success in such a role.

What can you do to prepare yourself for a management/leadership position?

- Take a business class. Many leaders and managers have a strong foundation in business, strategic planning, financials and people management skills. You may also consider continuing on to get your MBA.
- Ask a mentor or an established leader to take you under their wing and train and guide you towards this path. Many of the best leaders have learned from on the job training and have been groomed over the years on the job to become a successful leader.
- Observe and take a lot of notes from the leaders that you admire. As the saying goes "imitation is the sincerest form of flattery" and in this case the imitation of the traits and skills of a well respected leader can be a valuable training tool for someone wanting to learn about leadership.
- In some companies, employees are offered a management or leadership training program. Seek out programs like this and volunteer for as many activities, promotions, or projects as you can to help you to gain experience in this area.

For all of you aspiring managers and leaders out there, your journey towards one day running your own business or serving as the Executive Vice President has just begun. Enjoy the journey as one day down the road you will look back at your career path and know that the small steps you took along the way are what set you up for success.

ABOUT THE SPEAKERS:



Mr. Frick is currently Director of Division of Environmental Assessment and Restoration of the Florida DEP. That Division is responsible for implementing the Florida Watershed Restoration Act and the Clean Water Act for the State of Florida including setting water quality standards, monitoring and assessing surface water quality, establishing TMDLs and restoration of goals, and developing and implementing Basin Management Action Plans, the

blueprint for restoration. Mr. Frick holds a BS in Chemistry. Prior to his current position. Mr. Frick was Bureau Chief of DEP's Bureau of Watershed Restoration.



Mr. Janicki is president of Janicki Environmental and has worked for more than 20 years dealing with water quality and quantity concerns in Florida. Much of his work had been for local governments, water management districts, and national estuary programs. His most recognized efforts have been for the Tampa Bay Nitrogen Management Consortium and recently in

developing Numeric Nutrient Criteria for southwest Florida estuaries and in the examination of water quality problems in the Indian River Lagoon. He contributed to the establishment of the Impaired Waters Rule and has been instrumental in MFL development for four of the state's water management districts. This work has included examination of MFLs for the Silver, Ichetucknee, Suwannee, and Peace rivers.
