








## **FWEA SYPC Leadership Organizational Charts**

## S&YPs Engagement: Central Florida Chapter Student Liaison Recap - Fall 2024

"The FWEA Central Florida Chapter (CFC) is marking the end to yet another successful semester of student-led initiatives! FWEA CFC partnered with students from the University of Central Florida's Society of Environmental Engineers (SEE) and American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) student chapters to organize water and wastewater treatment plant tours, a General Body Meeting (GBM) presentation, football tailgate, as well as a beach cleanup in conjunction with FSAWWA and ASCE Space Coast.


The semester kicked off with a UCF SEE meetand-greet early in the semester which not only highlighted upcoming CFC events, but also the benefit of getting involved - and staying involved - in professional organizations. Students were educated on the organizational structure of FWEA, the FWEA Internship and Mentorship programs, as well as the Florida Water Resources (FWRC). Students Conference were encouraged to take advantage of the numerous free FWEA student memberships available and to participate in FWEA committee and chapter activities. This semester kickoff meeting transitioned perfectly to CFC's first football event. Despite periodic tailaatina students showed up in numbers and enjoyed lunch, fun games, and catered conversation with a handful of professionals in the industry.

During early planning efforts with the student chapter leadership, it was revealed that students were most interested in plant tours this semester. CFC leadership coordinated with contacts at Orange County Utilities (OCU) and the UCF Utilities & Engineering Services to schedule tours to visit OCU's South Water Reclamation Facility (SWRF) and UCF's water and power infrastructure. OCU's SWRF was identified as a facility of particular interest due to its large capacity and close proximity to Universal's EPIC® Universe theme park. Although UCF does not have any on-site wastewater treatment, students granted a behind-the-scenes walking tour of the distribution and power generation facilities that exist on-campus. Between these two tours, students gained valuable insight regarding how the engineering and process theory taught in classrooms gets applied in the real-world.



The pinnacle event of the semester was the annual FWEA Beach Cleanup held on the Space Coast in early November 2024. Leading up to this event, the FWEA community received tragic news that one of our own volunteers, Amber Balester, passed away unexpectedly. Amber worked with GOVAPEXTM in Cocoa, FL and was an up-andcoming FWEA rockstar having graciously taken on volunteering roles within both FWEA CFC and the Students and Young Professionals Committee (SYPC). Because Amber was excited to co-organize this year's beach cleanup, the decision was made to dedicate this year's event in her honor. To that end, volunteers from FWEA CFC, FSAWWA Region III, ASCE Space Coast, and GOVAPEXTM banded together to make this year's event particularly special. The result was a beautiful day spent with friends and family to share laughs, tidy up a local beach, and enjoy another excellent barbecued lunch by the GOVAPEXTM group. FWEA looks forward to dedicating this event in Amber's honor for years to come. In all, this marked another successful semester of student-led events from the Central FL region. The CFC hopes that continued coordination with students will foster the next generation of FWEA volunteers and water professionals. In CFC's experience, the future of Florida's water industry is looking very bright! We would like to encourage volunteers from other chapters to leverage the lessons learned by the CFC during the planning stage and to take advantage of the informational and financial support available through the SYPC. ## **2024 WEFTEC Highlights**

The University of Florida (UF) and University of South Florida (USF) teams won the 2024 FWRC SDC Environmental and Wastewater Categories, respectively, granting them the opportunity to present their designs in the fall at WEFTEC. The UF team continued its winning momentum, bringing home a first-place title in the national Environmental Design category (this is the first time a Florida team has placed first at the WEFTEC SDC since 2014)!

"I also attended affinity events like the Hispanics in Water Luncheon and the Student and Young Professional (SYP) Meeting, where I connected with others who similar backgrounds experiences. Walking the showroom left me in awe-curious and hopeful to learn more about emerging technologies in the water sector. Speaking with companies at the SYP Career Fair reinforced just how exciting it is to be part of this industry. Through these experiences, I gained clarity on the path I want to pursue-wastewater treatment and beneficial reuse.

Thanks to InFLOW, I'm stepping into this next chapter with a deeper understanding of the field and a strong network of mentors and peers. As I prepare to graduate, I feel energized by the possibilities ahead and eager to contribute to the future of water.

I grew up biking and hiking in the mountains of Honduras, where rainfall would nourish our creeks and vegetation. The environment was an integral part of my upbringing, but as a child, I struggled to understand why, despite all the rain, water issues persisted in the city. Studying environmental engineering at USF helped me connect the dots-poor water management and aging infrastructure can deeply affect communities. My curiosity led me to research stormwater pond quality, where I first became interested in water reuse. Encouraged by my advisor, I applied to the InFLOW STEMpath program, an initiative designed to introduce students from diverse backgrounds to careers in the water sector. Last October, I had the incredible opportunity to attend WEFTEC as part of this cohort.

Looking back, attending WEFTEC as an InFLOW scholar gave me a strong foundation for building a career in water. From touring a wastewater treatment plant to meeting current and future leaders at the Water Leadership Institute celebration, every experience held immense value. The program also paired me with an amazing mentor, Ramya Sankar, who has guided me through career exploration and professional growth. I had the chance to speak with professionals at all stages of their careers, gaining insights into paths their aspirations."

## Making an Impact: 2024 WEFTEC Service Project

"This year, I had the distinct privilege of chairing the WEFTEC Service Project, an experience that was both profoundly challenging and deeply rewarding. The project was hosted at St. Mary's Academy in New Orleans, a private Catholic college preparatory school renowned for its rich history and commitment to education. St. Mary's includes a co-educational elementary division and an all-girls middle and high school, operated by the Sisters of the Holy Family, the country's oldest congregation of African American nuns.

The focus of this year's project was to enhance drainage around the cafeteria entrance at St. Mary's Academy. This improvement was critical to ensuring the safety of students and staff by mitigating flood risks and creating a more resilient campus environment.

Our community partners played an essential role, bringing their expertise and enthusiasm to every stage of the project.

Their collaboration not only made this project possible but also underscored the power of teamwork in addressing environmental challenges. One of the hallmarks of the WEFTEC Service Project is its inclusive nature. Registration is free and open to all WEFTEC attendees and their guests, making it an excellent opportunity for participants to engage with the host city.








## **House of Delegates**

She was only 34, vibrant, full of life, and a remarkable person whose spirit could brighten even the darkest of days. I still vividly remember the first time I met her. It was only three years ago, and even though we exchanged just a few short words, I knew right away she was someone special. In my career, I've met thousands of people, but she was unlike anyone else. There was an immediate connection like we had known each other our entire lives. It was that instant, that bond, that would grow into one of the most cherished friendships of my life.

Her open heart and genuine spirit made it easy for our friendship to blossom. Our weekly Taco Tuesdays and Thursday lunch outings became routine, simple yet cherished moments. We had our favorite spots, but we were always open to trying new ones, eager to make memories and share stories. Over time, I got to know her outside of work, she introduced me to her family, and I introduced mine to hers. We both shared a love for all things Disney, and soon, our families were creating special traditions. Visiting the gingerbread houses at Christmas, colorful Easter egg displays at Disney Resorts, and theme park visits, became some of the best memories we shared together.

She was particularly passionate about Disney World, and her love for Stitch was something truly special. Her world revolved around that lovable blue alien, and it was a joy to see her light up whenever she talked about him. But more than just Disney, Amber's heart was filled with love for her family. Every evening, she would gather with her grandmother and loved ones for dinner. She made family time a priority, whether it was planning a trip to Disney or organizing a getaway to Tennessee. She had a way of making everyone feel included, no one was ever left out of her plans or her heart.

Professionally, she approached her work with diligence, compassion and determination. She was always willing to tackle any task, big or small, and if she didn't know how to solve a problem, she would find the answer. Her dedication allowed her to rise quickly within our organization, taking on numerous responsibilities. We all came to rely on her. She also found joy in joining outside organizations, where she was welcomed with open arms, quickly earning the respect of professionals beyond our company. She once told me she never could have imagined how much she would grow in her career, and it's true. She had only just begun to show the world what she was capable of. I have no doubt she would have continued to inspire and lead for many years to come.

Amber, I am so proud and honored to have been a part of your life, even if for such a short time. I will forever cherish the memories we made together, the lunches, the laughter, and of course, your magnetic smile. Your heart was full of light, and your spirit will never be forgotten. I believe her outlook on life can best be summed up by a quote from Walt Disney: "No matter how your heart is grieving, if you keep on believing, the dream that you wish will come true." I take comfort in knowing that your dreams, Amber, are now a part of the stars, shining brightly for all of us to see. I'll see you again, my friend. Until then, you will always have a place in my heart.

Amber was such a remarkable person. I still remember my first week in the office when she shared that her dad had just returned from a fishing trip in the Bahamas. To my surprise, she brough me some of the fresh catch to take back home to Kansas! We tucked the fish into the freezer that morning and as the day went on, we hadn't thought through how to keep it cool for the journey home. Our plan was to buy dry ice – only to discover that flying with dry ice was prohibited! Amber improvised and crafted homemade ice packs to wrap around the fish and even lent me her own cooler to transport it safely home. I feel incredibly grateful to have known her. Her spirit and kindness will always be remembered.
